Mayor Palmer attended a Republican's party dinner to give an update about the City; she and City Administrator Pruett visited the airport again and spoke with Mr. Theil to clarify some of the areas of the airport she was confused about; attended an event where Arizona Sheriff Mark Lamb spoke about the flood of fentanyl coming over the border; spoke with Caltrans regarding the repaving project along highway 233/Robertson Boulevard that will begin in 2023/24, She was contacted by several people regarding the development behind Save Mart over concerns of dust, availability of water. And finally, a couple of businesses asked her about small business loans and she referred them to Director Hamilton.

## **2.2 STAFF VERBAL REPORTS**

City Administrator Pruett attended the Measure N Oversight Committee meeting in which the budget was presented, and discussed the Fire Department going into a full time 1-0 level of service. He and Director Rogers met with Yamabe and Horn Engineer Josh Rogers who is going to be working with us while Jerry Jones is out. Staff is continuing to work with Tyler, payroll module may go live January 1, 2022; however, everything else going live in September. Staff is currently beginning audit preparation. He and Director Rogers met with Mid Valley Disposal to discuss the organic recycling and fees. Today, had a Rancho Calera meeting in which the attorneys are finalizing the agreement by the end of this week; should be brought before Council in September for approval. Contacted Madera County CAO Varney and City of Madera City Manager Rodriguez regarding an Intergovernmental meeting, and tentatively are looking at having this meeting in February 2022. Continuing to work on the CFD, fiscal impact analysis and the development impact fee study. The City will be featured in magazine this September regarding city growth.

Commander Palmer reported the Officers Cobb and Inzunza were promoted to Sergeant. He reported out about the fentanyl crisis, where it mostly comes from, why it is used and how it is spreading throughout the state, including our community.

Fire Chief Gaumnitz updated the Council on the "minimum staffing" requirement for the Fire Department.

Public Works Director Rogers updated Council on the following projects:

Robertson Median Beautification – The landscape architect is moving forward with the design modifications that Council previously requested, which will take into consideration Caltrans design standards and Union Pacific setbacks as required. Additionally, once it moves further into design, staff will coordinate with Caltrans and Union Pacific to ensure compliance with their standards.

In regards to the Police Department Fence Project, City Engineer Josh Rogers has stated that the architectural plans will be ready by August 27, 2021 for immediate bid. Additionally, last week, the CEQA Notice of Exemption was filed for the project so that construction can move forward without any CEQA delay.

Last week, the State Water Board announced a Community Water System COVID Relief Program that they anticipate providing federal ARPA funds as direct assistance to public water systems to forgive customer water debt accrued during the COVID-19 Pandemic. While they are currently developing the program, we will work with the State in case we are eligible to receive funds.

And finally, Director Rogers mentioned that the City has finally filled the Water System Supervisor position. City employee Mike Breashears was promoted from his lead operator position to the supervisor position. Mr. Breashears has eagerly embraced this role and staff is happy to have him in his new role.

Community & Economic Development Director Hamilton announced that the Permit I/II position has been filled. The vendor for the business loan program has modified the application to allow for more funding per business/per job availability.

Recreation & Community Outreach Manager Wisener Senior Center ribbon cutting ceremony slated for September 7 at 10 a.m. the Christmas tree that was transplanted to another location is currently in shock, and thanked Parks & Facility Worker Charles Reale for tending it. this tree, unfortunately will not be used for this years' Christmas Tree lighting ceremony. Coffee with a Cop on August 17 at the new Macaroon Coffee Shop. She is also working on the oath of office ceremony.

### **RECOMMENDATION:**

That the City Council discuss and possibly take action with the proposed letters presented by Nisei Farmers League President Manuel Cunha, Jr.

### **BACKGROUND:**

This item is related to the Farmer Workforce Modernization Act of 2021, or more commonly known as the Immigration Reform Bill, or H.R. 1603. The Act would allow illegal immigrants who are working in agriculture to receive Certified Agricultural Worker Status (CAWS) and eventually lawful permanent resident status. The Act would also reform the H-2A nonimmigrant (temporary) agricultural worker program. The Summary of the bill is attached. ### **REASON FOR RECOMMENDATION:**

Other agency councils have been approached by Nisei Farmers League to present their proposal to obtain their support. Since HR 1603 is multifaceted, some agencies have requested to rewrite the letters to reflect only on those items that they support.

### **ALTERNATIVES:**

Either approve, rewrite, or decline the proposed letters.

# Summary: H.R.1603 — 117th Congress (2021-2022)

## Passed House (03/18/2021)

### Farm Workforce Modernization Act of 2021

This bill contains provisions related to alien farmworkers, including provisions establishing a certified agricultural worker (CAW) status and changing the H-2A temporary worker program.

The Department of Homeland Security (DHS) may grant CAW status to an applying alien who (1) performed at least 1,035 hours of agricultural labor during the two-year period prior to March 8, 2021; (2) on that date was inadmissible, deportable, or under a grant of deferred enforced departure or temporary protected status; and (3) has been continuously present in the United States from that date until receiving CAW status. The bill imposes additional crime-related inadmissibility grounds on CAW applicants and makes some other grounds inapplicable.

CAW status shall be valid for 5.5 years and may be extended. DHS may grant dependent status to the spouse or children of a principal alien.

An alien with a pending application may not be detained or removed by DHS and shall be authorized for employment until DHS makes a final decision on the application.

A CAW alien (and dependents) may apply for lawful permanent resident status after meeting various requirements, including performing a certain amount of agricultural labor for a number of years.

DHS shall create an electronic platform for (1) filing H-2A petitions, (2) facilitating the processing of H-2A cases, and (3) providing agencies a single tool for obtaining H-2A-related case information.

The bill makes various changes to the H-2A program, such as (1) modifying the method for calculating and making adjustments to the H-2A worker minimum wage, (2) specifying how an employer may satisfy requirements that it attempted to recruit U.S. workers, (3) requiring H-2A employers to guarantee certain minimum work hours, (4) making the program available for agricultural work that is not temporary or seasonal, and (5) reserving a visa allocation for the dairy industry.

DHS shall establish a pilot program allowing certain H-2A workers to apply for portable status, which gives the worker 60 days after leaving a position to secure new employment with a registered H-2A employer.

DHS shall establish an electronic system patterned on the E-Verify Program for employers to verify an individual's identity and employment authorization. Employers hiring individuals for agricultural employment must use the system.

This bill permanently establishes the Housing Preservation and Revitalization Program, which provides financing assistance for rural rental housing and off-farm labor housing and rental assistance for qualified tenants of such housing. It also authorizes the Department of Agriculture to provide various assistance, including funding for insuring loans and grants for new farmworker housing.
